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CHP, Sandy and NYS Energy Policy

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CHP

- Integral to NYS energy policy
- Complements central station/T&D model
- Defers delivery system upgrades
- Increases system reliability
- Reduces peak loading, line losses
- Utilize wasted thermal energy

PROGRAMS

- Supported since 2000
- R&D and deployment programs accommodate specific marketplace needs
- R&D helps defer non-price risks
 - Non-price risks (institutional, regulatory)
 - Technology development & transfer
 - Market & product definition
- Deployment closes price gaps
 - Performance based payments
 - Feasibility studies

INVENTORY

- ~190 project sites
- \$120M NYSERDA funding covering 20% of costs
- ~260 MW when all planned projects completed
- ~0.5 MW typical size
- Meets/exceeds 60% FCE, <1.6lbs/MWh NOx
- Building types (housing, health, schools, commercial, industrial)
- Fuels (natural gas, biomass, waste energy)
- Technologies (IC, MT, FC, Steam)

EVOLUTION

- Utility coordination SIR, Tariffs
- Islanding encouraged after 2003 black-out
- Proper sizing
- Fuel conversion efficiency
- High thermal utilization
- Minimize emissions

EVOLUTION

- Facilities of refuge
- Grid independent operation required
- Minimize customization – pre-packaged, pre-engineered
- Catalog
- Increase penetration in sub 1.3Mw market

SANDY

- Informal survey of installations in affected areas
- All* “islanding” capable units worked
- Common failures of emergency back-up units
 - Failure of ancillary equipment (pumps, circuits)
 - Deterioration of fuel due to intermittent use

POST SANDY

- Governor's Commission recommendations
 - Improve resilience and strengthen critical networks and infrastructure: Electric, Fuel, Communications
 - Focus on clean DG/CHP with multiple objectives
- New Program Changes
 - “High and dry” requirement
 - N+1 redundancy encouraged
